

Second Street Corridor Improvement Project

Second Street, once a State Highway, continues to serve as a crucial connector between State Route 2 and State Route 9, handling one of the highest daily traffic volumes in the City. In 2017, the City of Snohomish was awarded a \$323,000 grant from the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) Pedestrian and Bicycle Grant program to support the planning and design of improvements along Second Street, from Avenue J to the Centennial Trail.



The primary goal of the Second Street Corridor Improvement Project is to address aging infrastructure and enhance pedestrian safety. To achieve this, various safety and traffic-calming features will be implemented, including bulb-outs, warning beacons, lighting, signage, and more. The project also aims to transform Second Street from its former highway characteristics into a community-oriented corridor that better reflects the historic character of Snohomish. Key concerns, such as speeding and pedestrian safety, will be addressed to create a safer, more welcoming environment. Additionally, the project will improve parking and access for both residents and visitors.



With the 90% design completed in 2020, the project was placed on hold while funding for construction was sought.

Once the First Street Master Plan Project is completed, the City will revisit the Second Street Corridor Master Plan, bringing the designs to 100%. The two plans will be integrated to ensure they complement one another and create a seamless, cohesive streetscape that enhances the community.
